Why are grass clippings harmful to stormwater?

Yard waste →contributes nutrients such as nitrogen and phosphorous → which causes unwanted and uncontrolled growth of algae and aquatic weeds!

Which are more harmful to the stormdrain oil or grass clippings? If you guessed **GRASS CLIPPINGS** you were right!

Why?

If you were to pour a quart of oil and a bag of grass clipping down the storm drain at the same time clearly the oil would be the most harmful to

stormwater.

However, most people know not to pour oil down the storm drain but don't think twice about hosing/sweeping their yard waste down the stormdrain. And when you examine the overall cumulative effect of thousands of people sending their grass clippings down the storm drain versus the few who put oil down the drain it becomes one of the **top pollutants** of stormwater.

What are you going to do with all your grass clippings?

- Leave them on your lawn
 - As the grass clippings decompose, they will provide a source of nitrogen for your lawn, reducing your fertilizer needs and saving you money.
- Bag and remove those grass clippings.
 - Try composting them! Compost provides nutrients and organic matter to improve your soil. Compost is great for the garden, but can also be used as mulch around trees, shrubs and other plantings.
- Don t forget to sweep up!
 - Grass clippings left in the road or on the driveway will wash away in the next rain. Runoff will move the grass clippings into the storm drain where they will be delivered to the nearest stream, lake.

Grass clippings are great for your yard, but they damage our waterways, fueling weed and algae growth. So keep yard waste at home and put it to work for you.
